

## Purpose of the Colorado 4-H Dog Project

- · Learn to be a responsible dog caretaker for guide dogs for the blind.
- · Learn to work with animals and with people.
- · Grow as an individual through this 4-H experience.

### Minimum Requirements for Project Completion

- Have major responsibility for training and caring for a dog during the duration of your project.
- Complete the information asked for in this record book and/or the official guide dog project book.
- Attend regular guide dog club meetings and participate in socialization get-togethers.
- Your club and/or county may have additional requirements.

To be of value, a record book must be complete, accurate and legible.
