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Tips:

- Swine require 8-12 feet per animal.
- They need a pen or a shelter from the weather.
- Swine for fairs are usually born between January 1st and March 1st.
- Good nutrition is critical for the success of the project.
 Visit with your Extension 4-H Specialist and your local feed store for feeding help.
- Clean water daily is essential for market swine.
- Swine need a way to cool off on hot days.
- Deworming is necessary to promote swine growth and health. Visit with your veterinarian for a deworming plan.




