RULES AND REGULATIONS

Entry

Each county is invited to enter one 4-H livestock judging team consisting of no more than four members. The team members with the three high scores will be counted for the team points; however, all individuals are eligible for individual awards. The team members will be selected in a manner determined in accordance with state 4-H policy. All entries must be submitted in accordance with the registration for the State 4-H Conference.

Contestants and Eligibility

- 1) Teams may be selected by any procedure which a county or area deems appropriate while complying with state 4-H policy. It is recommended that selection procedures, in writing be made available to all interested parties and participants.
- 2) At the Colorado State 4-H Livestock Judging Contest, contestants must have past their 14th birthday and be no older than 18 as of midnight December 31 of the previous calendar year.
- 3) Contestants must be enrolled in 4-H in the county or area they represent or combined in accordance with state 4-H policy prior to April 15 of the current year.
- 4) At the Colorado State 4-H Conferences Livestock Judging Contest 4-H members may compete as individuals from counties that do not have full (3-4 members) judging teams and are eligible for individual awards only. Individuals must be properly entered in the contest.
- 5) Any member of a past winning team of the Colorado 4-H Livestock Judging Contest or member who competes at the National 4-H Livestock Judging Contest, as the official Colorado 4-H Livestock Judging team will not be eligible to compete on any team at the Colorado 4-H Livestock Judging contest. These members are eligible to compete as an individual's and for individual awards only.



- 6) Contestants in 4-H competitive events must not have participated in official post-secondary (university, college, junior college or technical school) competitive events, of a similar nature in the same subject matter area to be eligible for participation in 4-H competitive events. Neither can that individual be a member of a postsecondary team undergoing training in preparation for a post-secondary event of the same nature. For example, a contestant who has competed in an official collegiate livestock judging contest, either on or off campus, is ineligible to compete in a similar 4-H livestock judging contest.
- 7) Alternates will be eligible to judge for individual awards.

Method of Conduct

- 1) A coach's meeting will be held prior to the contest at a time announced in the conference materials. At this time, instructions for the contest will be given. Coaches should be prepared to check the names, addresses and ages of contestants for the contest.
- 2) No contestant shall wear any clothing, pins or badges that will in any way reveal his or her identity or county they represents. Weather conditions may vary, so dress accordingly. No hats are to be worn during the contest.
- 3) The contestants will be divided into groups for the contest and will remain with the assigned group throughout the contest. While the contest is in progress, there shall be no conferring between contestants or between a contestant and anyone else except by the Superintendent, group leader, or designated contest officials. The superintendent (or their designee) reserves the right to take a contestants card or disqualify them from the contest for talking or conferring that is deemed excessive or in direct violation of this rule.
- 4) The contest will be comprised of 12 classes of livestock. All of these classes will be comprised of four animals and the animals will be designated by numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4. If possible, performance data and/or a situation statement for the class may be provided on breeding classes.
- 5) Reasons and/or questions classes may be market, breeding, and/or performance classes. Reasons will be taken on 6 classes, 2 from each division. Contestants may use a clipboard and/or notepaper of their choice. Contestants are not permitted to use any notes while answering questions.



- 6) There will be two sets of questions. These question points will count for each division that the questions are asked on. Each set of questions will consist of 10 questions. No questions will be asked on removable IDs (such as color of ear tag).
- 7) Performance data will be limited to no more than 10 pieces of information. Performance data used will reflect current industry trends for that specific breed or type of animal. Performance data may be actual animal performance (such as growth) or genetic predictors (such as EPDs) or a combination of the two.
- 8) Oral reasons will be given to an official judge(s) and will be scored per Superintendent direction in regard to time allowed and use of notes. Contestants relying on any written data or notes when delivering oral reasons may be assessed a scoring penalty per Superintendent instruction.
- 9) Contestants will be allowed 12 to 15 minutes per class to make their observations, make notes if necessary and fill out their placing card.
- 10) Breeding cattle will not be handled. Steers will not be handled. All judging will be done from a distance to insure proper viewing (10 to 15 feet).
- 11) Breeding sheep/goats will not be handled when they are judged loose in a pen. If sheep or goats are in racks (market sheep/goats or fleeced breeding sheep), contestants will stand in line and will be allowed 15 seconds to handle each individually.
- 12) Contestants will have a minimum of 20 minutes to prepare each of the six sets of oral reasons.
- 13) All contestants and coaches are encouraged to be present for the awards program.
- 14) Contestants will not be allowed to carry electronic devices on the floor while judging. This includes mobile phones, pagers, PDA's, and other device capable of transmitting information. If a contestant is found with a device, the contestant's cards will be pulled and the contestant removed from the contest.



Superintendents

- 1) It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to see that all rules and regulations of the contest are carried out. They shall decide all questions which may arise in connection with the interpretation of the rules governing the contest.
- 2) The Superintendent will be responsible for giving necessary instructions to all contestants, coaches, group leaders, official judges and other designated contest officials in regards to contest etiquette, rules, classes, scoring, logistics and address potential contest issues as appropriate.
- 3) They shall have designated assistants/clerks to assist them.
- 4) They shall have charge of all records and shall have ratings tabulated and totaled.

Clerks and Assistants

The clerks, assistants and attendants shall be under the direction of the Superintendent and shall carry out all assignments in an orderly manner; and none of them shall confer with a contestant unless directed by the Superintendent.

Judges

- 1) A committee of judges will place all classes and hear and score all reasons.
- 2) The judges shall place the classes while the contestants are working in the area. The judges shall enter their placings on the placing card, indicate the cuts to be made, and file that card with the Superintendent.
- 3) During the reasons session, the judge will score the contestant when he or she has finished.
- 4) The official placings and cuts will be given by the judges immediately following the reasons session.
